Dog Travel Checklist

- Dog Food You have enough dog food for the length of your trip, plus a little extra in a sealed container.
- **Dog Crate** You didn't forget the dog's crate or carrier, if you use one.
- Dog Treats Did you forget the bag of dog treats?
- Water and Feeding Bowls I have extra water in a sturdy, BPA free, gallon (or larger) container.
- Leashes and Collars My pet's tags are affixed to their collar and have my latest info and a rabies tag. Do you have an extra leash in case yours breaks, or gets chewed up?
- Lighted Collars or Reflective Vest A LED dog collar or reflective vest can make it easier for people to see you at night.
- **Dog Beds** I've got my dog's favorite bed, or a lightweight travel version of it.
- Pet Jacket or Rain Gear You may encounter all kinds of weather on your trip. A pet rain slicker and warm jacket may come in very handy.
- **Dog Toys or Chews** You packed your dog's favorite toy or chew to help reduce anxiety when staying in new places.
- GPS Dog Tracker A GPS collar can help locate your pet if they become lost in an unfamiliar area.
- **Medications** I brought my dog's medications heartworm preventative, etc. in a small cooler.
- Muzzle If your dog requires a muzzle, don't forget it. They can be handy if your dog is injured, as even gentle dogs may "fear bite" if hurt.
- Blankets, Towels and Old Sheets If staying at pet-friendly Airbnb's or hotels, use these to cover furniture.
- Lint Roller A sticky lint roller can be very useful in cleaning dog hair from furniture in places where you stay.
- Poop Bags and Sealed Container I brought the poop bags & a well-sealed container to put full ones in.
- White Noise Machine A white noise machine can help keep your dog calm in a new place by masking unfamiliar new sounds
- Cleaning Supplies I've brought paper towels, cleaners, mop, and broom. Foam carpet cleaner can also help remove "pet accidents".
- **Vet Records** *If your dog requires medical care while you are on a road trip, the veterinarian will need to see their most recent records. Print them out and bring them along.*
- Your Vet's Phone Number I've got my vet's phone number in my contacts. This can save time in an emergency, if a new vet needs to speak to them.
- Pet First Aid Kit I packed a basic pet first aid kit, with gauze bandages, medical tape, antibiotic ointment, etc.
- Car Seat Belt Harnesses Essential Item. Seat belt harnesses keep dogs from being injured in an accident.
- Dog Shampoo and Grooming Brush I've got dog shampoo, brush and grooming supplies if my dog gets dirty.
- Dog Friendly Travel Guide Book. There are several good ones, including National Geographic's "The Dog Lover's Guide to Travel". See our blog for some great places to travel with your dog: DogOnaRoadtrip.com
- Dog Lifting Harness For those with old or injured dogs, a lifting harness can help make lifting them into the car easier on both you and your dog.
- Portable Pet Gate Use these to block off unused rooms, which may not have doors, to make cleaning up easier.
